Estonian Women's Championship (February 20 -26)



Occasional B.C. resident WFM Valeria Gansvind has won the Estonian Women's Championship with the overwhelming score of 8.5/9. This is quite an accomplishment, even if she was the highest rated and a number of Estonia's stronger players didn't take part. The championship had a number of younger entrants, including (presumably) three sisters - see the photos below. Valeria will be returning to B.C. next week and intends playing in the Grand Pacific Open at Easter and the Keres Memorial on the Victoria Day weekend.

B.C. CHAMPIONSHIP REGULATIONS 2009

1. The 2009 B.C. Championship will be an 8-player round robin, held on the Thanksgiving weekend.
2. The following players qualify for the Championship:
 - a. The 2008 B.C. Champion.
 - b. The 2008 B.C. Junior Champion.
 - c. The highest finisher in each qualifying tournament who has not already qualified for the Championship and who has held a regular CFC rating of 2000 or higher at some point.
 - d. The remaining qualifying spots will be filled from the last CFC rating list to be

published at least six weeks before the Championship. To qualify by rating, a player must have played in at least one regular-rated tournament since the 2008 Championship.

e. If a player who has qualified through criteria 2.a.-d. is unable or unwilling to play in the Championship, additional players would be taken from the rating list as set out in 2.d.

3. All participants in the Championship must have resided in B.C. for at least six months prior to the start of the Championship.

4. The following prizes will be provided by the BCCF:

a. First place: \$300.

b. Second place: \$200.

"Participants in the BC Closed must be members of the CFC. A tournament membership is not allowed for this tournament."

CANADIAN JUNIOR

Originally scheduled for Calgary, the bidding process for this annual U20 championship was reopened when it was found there was insufficient time to advertise the event properly. The CFC governors have now approved a new bid from the Victoria Junior Chess Society to stage the event in Victoria in July in conjunction with the CYCC and B.C. Open. FIDE RULE CHANGES

Every four years FIDE has the opportunity to implement changes to the official Laws of Chess, and this will happen on July 1st of this year. Most of the proposed changes are fairly minor, and are detailed by Geurt Gijssen in one of his Chess Cafe articles: <http://www.chesscafe.com/text/geurt129.pdf>. The one major change which has yet to be decided is the question of later arrivals at the board. At the Dresden Olympiad last autumn a new rule was used, that players who were not at their boards at the start of the round were forfeited. This regulation was just for that competition, but there have been suggestions that this be included in the Laws of Chess. To quote Gijssen:

"The old version is:

Any player who arrives at the chessboard more than one hour after the scheduled start of the session shall lose the game unless the rules of the competition specify or the arbiter decides otherwise.

The proposal was:

Any player who arrives at the chessboard after the start of the session shall lose the game, unless the arbiter decides otherwise. Thus the default time is 0 minutes. The rules of the competition may specify a different time.

If we compare the two, we see that nothing has changed. A tournament committee still has the possibility of specifying a default time of one hour. And in the old version 0 minutes, as applied in the Olympiad, is also possible."

The General Assembly in Dresden had trouble reaching a consensus on the issue, but then FIDE President Kirsan Ilyumzhinov made a third proposal:

Any player who arrives at the chessboard after the start of the session shall lose the game.

"As you can see, the FIDE President does not like to make any exception. Each tournament committee has to accept the 0 minutes rule and the arbiter has no possibility to accept an excuse for the late arrival of a player, even in case of a clear 'force majeure.'" (Gijssen). This proposal is apparently an attempt to bring chess competitions in line with what happens at the IOC Olympics. The final decision on the law will be made at a FIDE presidential board meeting shortly; it should be noted that Gijssen has "received several letters expressing the opinion that it would be a catastrophe for chess if Ilyumzhinov's proposal is accepted."
