Vancouver and Victoria. On Saturday, June 10, both players gave simuls in the Student Council Chambers, University of British Columbia. Exact numbers are a bit uncertain, but we believe Irina played twenty-three games, losing to Pavel Trochtchanovitch and Valer Eugen Demian and drawing with Alexandra Botez, while out of a total of twenty-nine games played Pascal lost to Louie Jiang and drew with Alfred Pechisker, Jorge Prieto, James Chan, and Alexandra Botez. In the evening Irina and Pascal participated in a pairs exhibition which also included Jack Yoos, Louie Jiang, and Pavel Trochtchanovitch, but details have not been forthcoming. TD'S CORNER: PLAYING WITH INCREMENTS

The Kitchener Chess Festival, to be held in the South-Western Ontario city July 10-23, will include the Canadian Junior, CYCC, and Canadian Open for 2006. All these events are using an incremental time control, i.e., a fixed base amount (90 minutes for the Canadian Junior and CYCC, 150 minutes for the Canadian Open) plus an additional 30 seconds every move, per player. Increments have not been much used in B.C. to date, so for those who are heading to these tournaments it might be useful to review how the rules change when an incremental time control is used. (The following assumes an increment of 30 seconds per move, for smaller increments, consult the Laws of Chess).

There are two main changes:

1) players must keep recording, no matter how much time they have left on the clock. In games involving a fixed amount of time (e.g., 40 moves in 120 minutes, game in 60 minutes) a player may stop recording when they have less than five minutes to reach a time control, but with the inclusion of a 30 second increment this is not an option - both players are required to continue recording the game until the bitter end.

2) the Quickplay Finish (Article 10.2) no longer applies. This claimed draw, discussed in the last issue of the Bulletin, only comes into force when the claimant has less than two minutes remaining for the entire game. Since the amount of time remaining is not fixed when an increment is involved, the Quickplay Finish is not applicable with an incremental time control - if your opponent refuses a draw offer, you must play the position out until another factor comes into effect (neither side can checkmate, triple repetition, 50-move rule).

It might also be worth highlighting some of the other rule changes which FIDE introduced as of July 1, 2005:

- a) the king may not be taken, even in a blitz game - this constitutes an illegal move.
- b) a player may not write their move down before playing it (except when claiming a draw).
- c) if a player's cell phone rings during a game, they automatically lose.

WOMEN'S INTERNATIONAL TOURNAMENT 1981

Twenty-five years ago Vancouver was looking forward to not one, but three major chess events: a Women's Tournament, the Western Canadian Open,

and a Fide-rated swiss, together constituting the Vancouver International Chess Congress. In the next few issues we will focus on each of these events in turn, beginning with the Women's Tournament.

Held at the Holiday Inn on Broadway from July 23 to August 2, the event brought together six players (two European, two American, and two Canadian) in what at that time was the strongest and richest international tournament for women ever held in North America (and nothing immediately comes to mind which would have eclipsed it since). Remember, this was in the PP era: Pre-Polgar. Judit turned five on the first day of the tournament.

In the end the two Europeans dominated the standings; each score 4.5/5 in the first cycle, but Cramling won their second individual encounter in round 6 and this proved to be her margin of victory. Canadian Champion Nava Shterenberg (now Nava Starr) comfortably took third, and Ruth Haring (wife of Peter Biyiasas) beat out her American compatriot Alexey Rudolph for fourth place.
