2007 KITCHENER CHESS FESTIVAL (August 1-6)

Last year the inaugural Kitchener Chess Festival included the Canadian Open, CYCC, and Canadian Junior. This year's edition, again spearheaded by the team of Hal Bond and Patrick McDonald, has also bundled several events, including the Canadian Closed Championship, the Canadian Women's Championship, and a Canadian Amateur Championship (which incidentally used to be the name of a tournament run by George Hara in Kamloops). There is no B.C. representation in the Closed or Women's championships, but Victoria's Paul Leblanc is making his presence felt - he is currently leading the U2000 Section of the Canadian Amateur with 5.0/6 and one round to play. Also participating is former B.C. resident Richard Ingram in the U2200 Section.

QUEBEC OPEN (July 20-28)

The overall winner of this year's Quebec Open was Russian GM Andrey Rychagov with 7.0/9, ahead of fellow GMs Alexander Huzman, Chanda Sandipan, Anton Shomoev, Eduardas Rozentalis, Abhijit Kunte, and Canadian IM Thomas Roussel-Roozman, all with 6.0. The latter's fine score was also sufficient for his first GM norm. The group of players on 5.5 included B.C.'s Bindi Cheng, another impressive result which was just a half-point shy of a second IM norm. Other players with a B.C. connection taking part were Jack Yoos, Louie Jiang, and Jonathan Berry. Reports indicate the hotel's air conditioner was not up to the task of dealing with Montreal's summer heat, resulting in rather warm playing conditions. The remaining two events of the Montreal International Chess Festival were won respectively by superstars Vassily Ivanchuk (8th Montreal International) and Pia Cramling (MonrRoi International Women's Grand Prix).

VCC CANADA DAY OPEN (June 30 - July 2)

[A full report on this tournament has not been forthcoming, but here are some comments and a game by Peter Stockhausen - thanks!]

The VCC tournament, while only attended by some eight or ten competitors, was very pleasant. The

site is carpeted, well lit, air conditioned, spacious (for at least thirty to forty competitors), and quiet. The playing tables are standard banquet tables, ideal for chess. An almost endless variety of drinks and snacks are available at very reasonable prices. All rounds, with maybe the exception of the first one, started on time and I personally liked the incremental time control chosen [game in 90 minutes with a 30 second increment - ed.]. It allowed for reasonable games while preventing poor souls from having to play ten/twelve hour days.

Being one of the weakest players on site, my games, based on lack of talent, lack of (chess) work ethic, and lack of practice had the predicted results. Not that I did not get good to winning positions, oh no, I got those, but boy did I mess them up!! Even so, the last round game, against the strongest player in the tournament, might be of some interest to other players like me. I am sure that my most gentlemanly opponent [brother of Jim Ferguson] would rather forget it ...

The text looks much stronger than it is. A critical position has been reached. I decided to sacrifice a pawn for the benefit of having rooks on the seventh rank.

Played instantly and wrong! The rook belongs on the c-file to prevent any future counterplay on that file: **28...Rc2. 29.Rg5 Rdd2 30.c5 f6 30...Rdc2** Is the correct plan. **31.Rg4 Ke7 32.Rc1 f5** Around here

RATINGS IN THE ARCHIVES

While in Ottawa recently I had a chance to visit the National Archives. They have a few chess items in their collection, including the historical CFC rating records going back to 1954. Bulletin #112 examined the first CFC ratings list, published in the Spring of 1954; the archives have the individual calculations that went into the production of the second list in October, 1955. These were carried out (by hand!) by the ratings auditor of the time, Phil Haley, who it should be noted is alive and well and was seen enjoying himself at the recent Canadian Open in Ottawa. Following is a segment of the list from October 1955; all players above 2100 are included, along with B.C. players over 1900. The 1954 ratings are also given for comparison purposes.

Despite the eighteen months between the two, the numbers in the 1955 list were compiled from comparatively few rated events (at least for B.C.). These were: 1954 B.C. Championship (and Minor), Vancouver Championship (and Minor), City Chess Club Championship (and Minor), Vancouver Chess Club Championship (and Minor), 1954-55 interclub team matches, and the 1955 B.C. Championship (and Minor).

Also in the Archives are a pair of hand-written letters from Jack Taylor to Phil Haley; Taylor had been given an advance copy of the 1955 list and was asked to comment on it:

July 6/1955

Dear Phil,

Thanks for sending me along your suggested copy of the B.C. ratings for 1955, and for asking my opinion on same. The picture on the whole is very good, I don't get *Chess Review*, but I remember before you told me something of the feud between Horowitz and Harkness, and I am quite sure that sour grapes is the main reason of Horowitz's opposition.

First of all let us eliminate all the players who have not played over a long period of time. G. Panton died two years ago, Eberhart is not playing chess, Dumfries, Hockin and Whyte I have not seen or heard of in over a year.

Now to the actual ratings, Jursevskis is OK. Zerkowitz is too high. G. Zerkowitz only comes over to play in the B.C. Championship event he has finished second the last two years which is very good, but Butkov because of his university studies here has never been able to play in the B.C. Championship, but on the other hand Butkov has won every other tournament he has taken part in, which has always also included Jursevskis.

I mean if Zerkowitz were playing in all the B.C. rated tournaments I feel sure he could not keep up his fine score because unfortunately the proper B.C. Championship is sometimes weaker than the Vancouver City tournament. In my opinion Phil, I would place Butkov in second place with say 2140. Zerkowitz I would place in third place with 2100. You have me placed about correct. I am sorry I have dropped down from the 2100 class, but the truth is I seem to have slipped a little this last year.

I think you have Fillery too high no doubt this is because of his good score in the recent B.C. Championship tournament but there again it's a one and only tournament for him, in my opinion both F. May and Prentice are stronger players than he is. Atnikov too seems a little high, otherwise I think the ratings are a very good representation of B.C. chess strength. Saila went to California a year ago so he can be eliminated also.

Well Phil I have tried give you a just and firm picture of B.C. chess strength.

Dear Phil,

Received your letter a few days ago, and as business men say contents noted.

I was not aware of that club tournament where Butkov did so badly, he certainly must have been way off form, but as you correctly say you can only go by the results. The same applies to Prentice he always seems much stronger than his tournament scores indicate, but then the results are what you have to go by. I have not been able to get all the scores of the recently concluded tournament you asked me for, but probably the results I have managed to get can be used for the top dozen players. We are playing now in a short but important tournament (its purpose is to get Jursevskis in top form) the six players are Jursevskis, Butkov, Duval, Pratt, Ridout, Taylor. I could send you along the results in two weeks time if you have not gone to press by then?

The weather now is beautiful sunny and hot and chess right now has not too much allure.
