HERE AND THERE

American Continental (May 15-23)

Currently taking place in Juan Dolio, Dominican Republic is the 2023 American Continental Championship, an eleven-round Swiss restricted to players from North or South America. Among the field of one hundred and fifty-eight are twenty-three GMs, including Jorge Cori, Sandro Mareco, Georg Meier (now playing for Uruguay), Luis Supi, and Gregory Kaidanov, while there are three Canadians in the twenty-five IMs: Raja Panjwani, and from this province Leon Piasetski and Raymond Kaufman. After five rounds there are five players tied for first with 4.5 points; Kaufman is part of the trailing group of thirteen a half-point back, while Panjwani has 3.5 points and Piasetski 50%. Vancity Rapid May (May 14)

The May edition of the ongoing <u>Vancity Rapid Chess League</u> returned to the Banquet Hall of the Thompson Community Centre in Richmond on Mother's Day, which may have accounted for the unusually small turnout of only fifty-three players. Both sections resulted in ties for first place: the Open was dominated by CM Jorge Nunez Asencio and NM Neil Doknjas, who both defeated top-ranked FM Oliver Schulte and FM John Doknjas (Neil also beat his other brother FM Joshua Doknjas for good measure) in scoring 5.5 points each (they drew their individual game). The usual tiebreaks didn't resolve the issue so for the first time in these competitions an Armageddon playoff

was used to decide the winner of the plaque: Jorge prevailed. Alone in third was NM David Miller on 4.5 points. The U1400 Section was won by Rio Vilches on tiebreak over Kevin Gilbert after they finished at the top of the crosstable with five wins apiece. 8th Stan Rogers Memorial (May 13)

Also known as the Chilliwack Open, the Stan Rogers Memorial (no, not the famous folk musician – the Stan Rogers in question was a prominent Chilliwack businessman and former federal Liberal Party riding president who was also a member of the Chilliwack Chess Club), has been held since

2014 except for two years during the pandemic. This year's edition was smaller than usual (just ten players) but nevertheless competitive; after five rounds of 25 + 5 the winner despite losing in the first round was Jose Prem with 4.0 points, followed by Jorin Cowley on 3.5 and the trio of Neelesh Jain, Tony Wang, and Arnie Lucki a further half-point back. <u>Standings</u> The previous winners:

Lago Maggiore op (May 5-7)

After the World School Championships in Rhodes, Greece, Elliot McCallum travelled on to the northern Italian town of Lesa (situated on the Piedmont side of Lake Maggiore) for a small international open tournament. The sixty entrants included nine rated over 2000, headed by IM Artem Gilevych and Marco Angelini (both Italy) – they finished clear first and clear second with 5.0 and 4.5 points respectively. Initially ranked sixtieth, Elliot scored 1.5/5 to finish in fiftieth place; his 1428 performance rating will stand him in good stead when his first FIDE rating is published in the next list. <u>Crosstable</u>

For their fourth rapid event the <u>Fraser Valley Chess Academy</u> employed a different venue, the gym of the Douglas Park Community School in Langley. Otherwise the format was the same, a six-round Swiss in two sections. The almost ubiquitous CM Jorge Nunez Asencio was the highest rated in the twentyplayer Open Section by a considerable margin and claimed first place with 5.5/6, only giving up a draw to third-place Jofrel Landingin in the last round. Second was Zachary Liu. The U1400 Section had seventy(!) entrants but still produced a clear winner, Tony Wang, also with 5.5/6. Three players tied for second a half-point back, Sanjay Raj Santhosh Raj, Martin Cook, and Narek Bobloyan. <u>Open U1400</u>

OKANAGAN OPEN (May 5-7) by Paul Leblanc **Mark Gulbinowicz Sweeps to Victory in Okanagan Open, completes chess comeback**

Chess in the Okanagan is alive and well. The second annual Okanagan Open, held at the Comfort Inn in Salmon Arm on 5-7 May, attracted forty-six players comprised of twenty-seven locals and nineteen visitors. The players had the added attraction of sharing the room with some of the top players from BC and Alberta who were competing in the annual BC vs Alberta match.

Mark Gulbinowicz of Surrey, who in earlier years was an A-Class player in his native Poland and only recently returned to chess after several decades, finished with a perfect 5.0-0.0 score. Close behind with 4.5 points was Cristian Ivanescu of Calgary who had two sons on Team Alberta.

Cristian also had a perfect score, having taken a half-point bye in round one then winning all subsequent games.

There was a three-way tie for Top U1500 player between Allan Kiplongei who recently arrived in Kelowna from his native Kenya, Bowen Wu of Vancouver and Rhyland Barker of Victoria. Huy Minh Vu of Kelowna captured the U1200 prize with 3.5 points. Another threeway tie occurred in the Unrated category between Zachary Chruszcz of Revelstoke, Nathan Doiron of Whitehorse, and Josiah Trentalance of Sorrento. The local newspaper, the *Salmon Arm Observer*, ran a feature on the tournament in their Sunday edition. GIJÓN 1965

The city of Gijón is situated in the Asturias of Spain on the coast of the Bay of Biscay. Between 1944 and 1965 Gijón hosted an small intermittent international tournament which was an important element in the rejuvenation of Spanish chess after the Second World War. The event allowed Spanish masters to gain experience against invited guests such as Euwe, Larsen, Prins, Rellstab, Donner, Rossolimo, and O'Kelly; the first two editions of the event also included World Champion Alexander Alekhine. In 1965 the tournament was held for the twelfth and last time shortly after the World Junior had occurred in Barcelona, and two participants from Barcelona joined the field in Gijón, Argentinian Luis Bronstein and Canadian Duncan Suttles. In Barcelona Suttles had lost to Bronstein in the preliminary stage (see <u>Bulletin #303</u>); in Gijón Suttles won their individual game but still finished second to Bronstein by a half point.


