HERE AND THERE

Munich Pfingst Open (May 31 – June 6)

Newly-minted IM Max Gedajlovic participated in the First Munich Pfingst (Pentecost) Open along with fellow Canadians Mike Ivanov and Geordie Derraugh. The one hundred and sixty-two player field includes twelve grandmasters and nineteen international masters, topped by Alexey Sarana, Anton Demchenko, Alexander Motylev, and Baadur Jobava. After six rounds Sarana is leading the field with 5.5 points, a half-point in front of seven players tied for second. Geordie has 4.0 points, Mike a half-point less, and Max has withdrawn after scoring a win, a loss, and four draws. Standings

Washington Open (May 27-29)

Held on the American Memorial Day weekend immediately after our Victoria Day weekend, the Washington Open is the chessic double header following the Keres Memorial. There were few who played in both events, but one common element was American IM Georgi Orlov, who tied for first in the Keres and also achieved the same feat in Redmond – in the latter case his fellow winners were Kyle Haining, Samuel He, and Ryan W. Porter (all scored 5.0 points). Among the eight players who tied for fifth a half-point back was Jingyun (Ryan) Yang; other Canadians participating included Zachary Liu, Trevor Soare, Jarvis Ou, and Don Hack. Crosstables

BC InterSchool Junior Championship (May 27-28)

The latest tournament held under the auspices of the <u>Fraser Valley Chess Academy</u> was actually three events in one, all hosted at H.D. Stafford Middle School in Langley, with the junior participants competing for both individual and school prizes. <u>Section A</u>, consisting of those in grades 1-5, was a six-round rapid event on the Saturday with a time control of 15 + 10. Despite there being ninety-five entrants there were clear winners for first and second, Lucas Yao and Rex

Yu, who scored 6.0 and 5.5 points respectively. Tied for third were Henry Fan, Kai Zhongkai Zhang, Augustus Chow, Samuel Xu, and Huy Minh Vu. Those in grades 6-9 were in Section B and contested six games at a regular time control of 55 + 5, spread over both days of the weekend. Here there was a five-way tie for the top places in the eighty-player field between Tony Wang, Ryan Bole Yu, Zhejin Chen, Arnav Gautam, and Nikita Makogon. Section C comprised thirty-six players in grades 10-12 who competed in a twelve-round Blitz tournament (3 + 2) on the final Sunday. Matthew He and Peter Yong Qiu shared top honours with 11.0/12, a point ahead of Srush Mohammad who was third.

Lulu Island Rapid (May 27)



Founded by Ryan Leong and dedicated to promoting chess in Richmond, <u>Lulu Island Chess</u> held its inaugural Rapid Tournament at Bethany Baptist Church in Richmond on May 27. Employing the almost ubiquitous format of a six-round Swiss at 15 + 10 and two sections (Open and U1400), this first annual event attracted seventy-three enthusiasts despite competing attractions elsewhere (see above). The thirty-seven player <u>Open Section</u> included some of the 'usual suspects' but this time it was NM Mayo Fuentebella who came out on top with 5.5 points, just ahead of Leo Qu and Ethan Su (tied for second) and CM Jorge Nunez Asencio (clear fourth). The winner of the thirty-six player <u>U1400 Section</u>, Narek Bobloyan, also scored 5.5 points, Rochelle Gumpal was second and Gerry Bonggao, Jhen Maiquez, and Rojas Kennedy tied for third. Watch for the <u>SFU Summer Open and Blitz</u> coming up on June 24.

Ontario Open (May 20-22)

One BC player who did not play in this year's Keres Memorial was Jingyun (Ryan) Yang – instead he was a participant in the Ontario Open at the R.A. Centre in Ottawa. The thirty-two player Open Section included three GMs, Canada's Bator Sambuev plus Luis Manuel Perez Rodriguez and Reynaldo Vera from Cuba, but despite all these Elo points it was twelfth-ranked FM Johnathan Han who was the clear winner with 5.0/6. Second was Perez and FM Victor Plotkin on 4.5; Ryan tied for seventh with 3.5 points, drawing with Perez and splitting his games with the two IMs he faced, Jason Liang (USA) and Alexander Reprintsev (Ukraine). American Continental (May 15-23)

2023 American Continental Championship which took place in Juan Dolio, Dominican Republic ended after eleven rounds with a clear individual winner: GM Georg Meier, formerly of Germany but now affiliated with Uruguay, finished at the top of the field of one hundred and fifty-eight players with 9.0 points, a half-point ahead of GMs Carlos Daniel Albornoz Cabrera (Cuba) and Fidel Corrales Jimenez (USA). Seven players tied for fourth on 8.0 points topped by US IM Josiah Stearman; he, along with Meier, Corrales, and IM Gianmarco Leiva (Peru) qualify for the 2023 World Cup to be held in Baku this summer. (Albornoz Cabrera was already qualified.) Of the three Canadian participants only IM Raymond Kaufman completed the tournament, scoring 6.0 points. IMs Raja Panjwani and Leon Piasetski left the event after eight and nine rounds, finishing with 4.5 and 5.0 points respectively. Crosstable

47TH PAUL KERES MEMORIAL by Roger Patterson

Another year, another Keres Memorial – the 47th annual – as BC's longest running event [Open event: the BC Closed has been around since 1916]. This year's event saw 251 players – not a record but quite respectable. This was the first occasion we had committed to renting the full ballroom at the Executive Plaza so it's good the attendance numbers held up :-). Previous occasions when the full ballroom was used were the result of special deals because of hotel renovation or securing the full space at the last minute due to some special circumstances. This was also the first year that that we increased the number of sections to five in order to handle the higher number of participants.

So, another year, another Keres with IM Georgi Orlov at the top of the crosstable, sharing first with NM Neil Doknjas. I'd like to tell you Georgi's path to first place was a smooth march to victory but it wasn't. Georgi played with a very aggressive tactical style in almost all of the games and some of those games look decidedly iffy. The game between the co-winners looks like a strong attacking

sequence for Orlov that just didn't quite work and consequently settling for a draw. Neil was much more traditionally solid and is steadily rising the rating ranks to join his brothers as Team Doknjas.

Last year's co-winners, NM Keith MacKinnon and CM Jorge Nunez Asencio also played but were unable to keep up the pace to the top.

The event also produced a five-queen game. Games in which four queens appear on the board through promotion are fairly rare and usually the situation doesn't last long with either someone getting mated or the extra queens being traded. Five queens are rarer still and there are a few examples of six queens. In the fifth round, **Fuentebella - Qu** reached this position after move **64.h8=Q a1=Q**:



White is winning but remarkably, there is no immediate mating attack or simple queen trade. The win appears to be just making another queen! The game continued 65.Qxd8 Qaxc3+ 66.Nf6 Ka6 67.Q8a8+ Kb5 68.d7 (so slow!) 68...Kb4 69.d8=Q Reaching our five-queen position. Mate is not far. 69...b5 70.Qda5 mate.

The BCCF made two surprise presentations in round three - awards for outstanding support of chess in BC - to two long time BCCF Executive members who were stepping down. Stephen Wright (NM, IA), a fixture in BC Chess as a TD, the bulletin editor, and seven(!) consecutive terms as BCCF President (plus two more in the past) is stepping down as President although he will still be bulletin editor and otherwise heavily involved still in BC chess. The other, Roger Patterson (NM), (author of this report), is stepping down from many years on the executive including five as President as well as pulling back from tournament organizing. As President, he instituted the current BCCF per tournament membership system and oversaw the reorganization of the BCCF investment foundation, and is known as part of Victoria Chess which is responsible for revitalizing the tournament scene in BC after a dark period in the mid 2000s.

The award is deeply appreciated by myself. With reference to the Keres, I can remember as a young player in Alberta, hearing about the Vancouver 1975 event and subsequent Keres Memorials and being jealous that Vancouverites could play in such an event. At the time, it was just too far away for me. I never thought I would be responsible for organizing so many editions of the Keres for as many years as I have.

As always, it takes a lot of people to make an event like this happen. Many thanks to my compatriot in Victoria Chess Paul Leblanc, our head TD Stephen Wright and assistant TD Russell Mejia, equipment supply from VanCity Chess, and an enormous number of volunteers. This <u>report</u> with crosstables, a full list of all prizewinners and more photos.

[Editor: I don't remember when I first became aware of the Keres, but I was still living in Ontario when I acquired a copy of the February 1995 issue of *Counterplay* magazine (yes, BC had its own chess magazine in those days). The front and back cover were given over to Paul Keres and advertising for the upcoming twentieth Paul Keres Memorial. I was an admirer of those players who



retained their abilities to an advanced age, such as Lasker, Smyslov, and Korchnoi, and this included Keres. Playing in such an exotic frontier location as Vancouver (in comparison to London, Ontario) seemed a fantasy, yet shortly afterwards it became a reality and the rest, as they say, is history. I was forcibly reminded just before this year's tournament that I had played Georgi Orlov in the last round of the 1998 edition, twenty-five years ago – time flies...]

NATIONAL CHESS CHALLENGE

The thirty-fourth edition of this annual scholastic team event took place in Montreal, in-person for the first time since 2019. The BC team, consisting this year of Elliot McCallum, Sky Cui, Kai Zhang, Bowen Wu, Zachary Liu, Justin Gao, Jordan Zhu, Ethan Song, Gillian Mok, Kate Jiang, Luka Spasojevic, and Kevin Low (captain/coach), normally places third behind the two traditional powerhouses, Ontario and Quebec. Last year we slipped to fourth, but this year was different:

1 British Columbia 8.5 (84.5/108)

2 Ontario 8 (85)

3 Quebec 7.5 (86)

4 Alberta 6 (72)

5 Nova Scotia 4.5 (53)

6 Manitoba 4.5 (51)

Primary scoring was by match points (1, 0.5, or 0 for the whole team), meaning that it didn't matter if a team won by one or ten games, the points allotted were the same. Game points were only used for tiebreak purposes – had they been used for overall results the order of finish would have been Quebec, then Ontario and BC. Though a round robin pairings for the event are not drawn by lot but are based on the previous year's final standings, designed to build the tension by pairing the closest competitors together in the final rounds.

Despite BC's subpar result last year we had drawn with Quebec; this year BC was paired with Quebec in round five and gained a crucial match point by the minimum score of 6.5-5.5. In round seven BC drew with the strong Ontario squad, leaving BC ahead by 0.5 points going into the last round and Ontario needing to beat Quebec to tie for first and potentially win the competition on tiebreak (BC had not improved their chances by 'only' beating Alberta 7.0-5.0). As the various

results came in Ontario and Quebec remained neck and neck until the final game on board eleven was scored a draw and the BC team breathed a collective sigh of relief.

This win for Team BC is their first in the history of the event, also the first time the competition has been won by someone other than Ontario or Quebec. A tremendous achievement by all! In the individual board prizes BC garnered a total of eight trophies:

- 1 Elliot McCallum 9/9 first
- 2 Sky Cui 7.5/9 tied for second, second after playoffs
- 3 Kai Zhang 7 tied for second, second after playoffs
- 4 Bowen Wu 7 tied for second, second after playoffs
- 5 Zachary Liu 7.5 second
- 7 Jordan Zhu 7.5 second
- 8 Ethan Song 8.5 first
- 12 Kevin Low 7.5 second

Mention should be made of Justin Gao (grade 6) who was in a three-way tie for third place but placed fourth after playoffs. Congratulations to all and to the team as a whole! Further details can be found at the event website.
