Quesnel Chess Nuggets Rapid November (November 16)

Another <u>rapid event</u> in Quesnel, as reported by Kirk Morgan: "We had six players in total. Five men and one woman. After five hard fought rounds and much fun! Congratulations to: First: Justin Aney 4.0 points; Second: Robert Orlaw 3.0 points; Third: Nick Campbell 3.0 points." The <u>Quesnel Chess Nuggets</u> have been meeting on Friday nights at K-Max Games and Videos.

8th Mersin Open (November 10-16)

IM Bindi Cheng recently took part in the Mersin Open, Mersin being a city on Türkiye's south coast, roughly on the same meridian as the east end of Cypress. The entire tournament had some four hundred and fifty participants but in the A Section (apparently for those rated 2000 and up) there were sixty-four. The field included six GMs and five IMs and apart from Bindi there was only one other North American player, former US champion Alex Yermolinsky. The overall winner was GM Sergei Lobanov (FIDE)with 7.0/9, while top-ranked GM Vitaliy Bernadskiy (Ukraine) was among the five players tied for second a half point back. Bindi did not have a great event, finishing on 50% and only playing one opponent above 2100.

8th Banff Open (November 9-11)



The 2024 Banff Open was one player shy of last year's record turnout at one hundred and thirty participants, including from this province Gilles Bruneau, Zachary Chruszcz, Andrew Court, Kevin Goodman, Conor Haran, IM Raymond Kaufman, Moses Li, NM Zachary Liu, Aiden Hao-Ting Lu, Oakley Pankratz, Dejan Radic, Marko Radic, Nathan Ping-Ying Wu, Joanne Xu, and Joey Xu

The Open Section included four IMs and twenty-two players over 2000 and after six regular rounds resulted in a four-way tie for first between IMs Olivier Kenta Chiku-Ratte and Jean Hébert, FM Tymur Keleberda, and NM Anand Rishi Chandra, each scoring 4.5/6. However, in Banff Armageddon games (White having more time but Black having draw odds) are used to determined an individual winner. After playoffs Anand Chandra emerged as the 2024 Banff Champion, repeating his victory from last year. Raymond Kaufman and Zachary Liu were among those who tied fifth a half-point off the pace. Elsewhere Kevin Goodman won the O1600 Section with a perfect score and Andrew Court tied for second in the U1600.

BC Junior Chess Winter Rapid (November 10)

The latest rapid event by the BC Junior Chess Association attracted a total of seventy players in two sections. The <u>Open Section</u> had only ten players and was won by Aiden Leong with 5.5/6, Minjun Koo and Kaiqi Qin tied for second. The much larger <u>U1400 Section</u> also had an individual winner, Karson Lu, who had a perfect score, but five players tied for second: Ryan Li, Samuel Gao, Sky Cui, Sion Park, and Alex Kubanek.

Okanagan Valley Rapid 2 (West Kelowna, November 9)



Following on from the inaugural event at the end of September, Okanagan Valley Rapid 2 drew a total of nineteen players to the West Kelowna Library for five rounds of rapid chess. As with the previous event the winner was Ameet Kumar Dalal – this time he improved his score to a perfect 5.0/5. Second and gaining over two hundred rating points in the process was Karim Elbably, while third was shared between Jensen Irvine and veteran Wayne Kort. If you're in the area, Okanagan Rapid #3 is coming up on December 14.

World Youth Championships (October 29 – November 9)



This year's <u>WYCC</u> (world championships by U14, U16, and U18 categories) were held in Florianópolis, Brazil (otherwise known as Floripa; see previous bulletins for BC participation in the last two editions of the annual Floripa Open). The competition featured five hundred and twenty players from sixty-two countries including Canada, who sent fifteen players, among them BC's

David Eirew. None of our Canadians were highly-ranked within the sections and the final results reflect this, although some improved on their initial tournament rankings by ten places or more. Best individual results were those of Hanxi (Hancy) Jiang who finished tenth in the U16G Section and WCM Anais Chloe Fiset (U14G), Jonath Joseph (U16), and Arnav Mane (U14) who made significant rating gains. David was in the tough U18 Section which included a GM, eighteen IMs, and nineteen FMs; his 3.5/11 final score was slightly above his rating prediction.

BC Junior Winter Rapid Championship (November 2)

The second edition of Fraser Valley Chess' BC Junior Winter Rapid Championship took place at the Christian Life Assembly Church in Langley with the seventy participants divided into three sections. In Kindergarten-Grade3 Chi Eden scored 5.0/6 to claim first place, just ahead of Ethan An and Tyler Hun. Barath Subramanian Suresh gave up a single draw in winning the Grade 4-7 Section, Kai Zhongkai Zhang and Bingda (Brady) Li were close behind with 5.0 points each. And Zachary Liu had a large ratings cushion in the Grade 8-12 Section and unsurprisingly came first with a perfect score; he was followed 2.0 points behind by Daniel Zhu, Bowen Wu, and Chris Mackay.

RCC Elite Chess Championship (November 2)



As previously this RCC Elite Championship consisted of two parallel events, one CFC rated for both adults and juniors, the other CMA rated for juniors alone. In the Open Section Ryan Leong and Yidong Chen both scored 3.5/4, Minhao (Billy) Wu was third on tiebreak over Pengsen Fang and Joanne Wangluo was the top girl. Alex (Guo Xi) Yu had a perfect 4/4.0 in winning the U1300 Section, May Wangluo and Trevor Ho tied for second and Martina Szeto top girl. In the CMA portion, Yucheng Liu and Avery Leung tied for first in the U800 Section, Anthony Wang was third and Nicole Jayawardena top girl, while the U500 saw Victoria Zeng finish with a perfect score, Luffy Xing and Martin Lai Tong Pak were second and third and Rachel Jayawardena was the top girl.

31st ProAm Copa Clarin (October 19-27)

Returning to South America, IM Leon Piasetski took part in this year's <u>Clarin Cup</u> tournament in Villa Martelli (on the outskirts of Buenos Aires) which attracted one hundred and thirty players, including five GMs and ten IMs. Four players tied for first with 7.0/9, in tiebreak order IM Lucas Coro, IM Pablo Ismael Acosta, GM Federico Perez Ponsa, and GM Leonardo Tristan (all Argentina)

<u>Uruguay Interdepartmental Team Championship</u> (October 11-13)

Before the above event in Argentina Leon played one rated game in Uruguay, in a team competition called the <u>Interdepartmental Championship</u>, the nineteen departments being the Uruguayan equivalent of provinces. Held in Punta del Este (a coastal city to the east of Montevideo), the event pitted eighteen teams in a five-round Swiss; teams could include up to six players but only four played at a time. Montevideo Gripe won the event on tiebreak over Lavalleja; Leon, playing for Maldonado A, only participated in one game but won it:

BC JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP (November 16-17)

Held once more under the auspices of the Chess2Inspire organization at the Bonsor Recreation Complex in Burnaby, the BC Junior Championship kept the same format as in recent years: a Championship Section (rated over 1300 CFC), a Reserve Section (rated over 700) and a Booster (under 700 or unrated). All sections employed a time control of 50 + 10 on the Saturday and 90 + 30 on Sunday. The forty-two player Champion Section included three masters and five players over 2000 but FM Ethan Song and NM Zachary Liu gave up costly draws in rounds two and three respectively and couldn't achieve a decisive result in the last round, allowing CM Jingyun (Ryan) Yang and Justin Xu to tie for first with 4.5/5. Ryan was first on tiebreak, thus repeating as Champion and qualifying for the 2025 BC Closed. Joanne Wangluo was the Top Girl, Aadit Arya and Zhengyu Chen were First and Second U1800 while Haoze (Dennis) Wang and Sining Lou claimed the U1500 prizes.



The Reserve Section attracted seventy-seven entrants but had a single individual winner in Jesse Law who achieved a perfect score. There was also a sole winner in second, Markus Li, who scored 4.5 points. Sofia Vigurs was the Top Girl, Aryav Aloke and Benjamin Yuan were the U1000 prize winners, and Martina Szeto was the Top Girl U1000. Seventy players participated in the Booster Section where there were in total twenty-one prizes. Josiah Lo, Rockwell Chan, Qianhui Wang, Darren Li, and Mingyang Zheng placed First to Fifth respectively, while Top Girls overall were Genevieve Tang and Nicole Jayawardena. For U500 Bryan Viet Tran, Jia Jerry, Azlaan Saad, Morgan Zhou, and Hanjin Yang were the place winners, and Nicole's sister Rachel Jayawardena was the Top Girl, while for unrated players Matthew Manzano, Daniel Luo, Nathan Chan, Simon Kuhl, and Mason Chow won the place prizes and Anika Soni and Caroline Chen were the Top Girls.

JACK TAYLOR MEMORIAL (October 25-27) by Paul Leblanc

The 44th edition of the Jack Taylor Memorial took place in Victoria on the weekend of 25-27 October. This tournament celebrates <u>Jack Taylor</u> who won the BC Championship five times between 1929 and 1953. The Jack Taylor Memorial was first held in 1973 under the name BCCF Diamond Jubilee and won by GM Peter Biyiasas. Several previous winners competed this year: Paul Leblanc 1989 and 2012; NM Roger Patterson 2007, 2013, 2014 and 2015; NM Zulfikar Sali 2018; IM Raymond Kaufman 2019; Zachary Liu 2022; Jason Williamson 2023

The tournament was held at the Commonwealth Recreation Centre in Saanich. It was the first time for any chess tournament at this venue and it proved popular with the players with ample free parking, an on-site café and good playing conditions. The Premier section was FIDE rated for the first time. Seventy-four players took part, playing one round Friday night and two rounds on each of Saturday and Sunday at a time control of Game in 90 with 30 second increments. Most players were pleased with this more traditional time control. About two thirds of the players were from Vancouver Island. The mix of adults and juniors was more balanced than most of the mainland tournaments that are heavily weighted with juniors.

Turning to the chess results, IM Ray Kaufman and NM Zachary Liu shared first place in the Premier Section. Ray defeated his most dangerous rival, NM Zulfikar Sali in round four then settled for a half-point against Zachary in the last round, both finishing with 4.5 out of 5.

The <u>U1300 Section</u> was dominated by Andrew Murray, a local player in only his second rated tournament. He was undefeated at 5.0-0.0. The tournament was organized by Victoria Chess with NA Marc Moisan as Tournament Director. The prize fund was \$3,000.

GREATER VANCOUVER TOURNAMENT #5 (October 19-20)



Organized by the Penny Chess Club, the fifth edition of the Greater Vancouver Chess Tournament took place the weekend after Thanksgiving and was held at the Bonsor Recreation Complex in Burnaby. A total of one hundred and eighty-one players participated, split as in previous events into four sections. As before, there were three rounds of 50 +10 on the first day followed by two 90 + 30 games on the Sunday. The twenty-three player Open Section included two IMs, one WIM, three CMs, and a total of twelve players players over 2000 but it was top-ranked IM Van Thanh Nguyen who came out on top, taking first place with 4.5/5. Tied for second were Bellevue junior Ted Wang and Yidong Chen who both beat higher-rated opponents in the last round (CM Jorge Nunez Asencio and IM Raymond Kaufman respectively) – Ted placed second on tiebreak. There were also trophies for best boys and girls in each section by two-year age brackets; for the Open, these went to Elliot McCallum, Lucas Yao, NM Zachary Liu, Aiden Hao-Ting Lu, and CM Jingyun (Ryan) Yang).

The <u>U1800 Section</u> was won by Bicheng Zhang with a perfect score, while Boyong Guo and Daniel Zhu placed second and third on tiebreak ahead of Jaydon Yuan, they all scored 4.0 points. Junior trophies went to Xavier Zhang, Barath Subramanian Suresh, Larry Yang, Ryder Hsu. Shaunavon Mu, Sofia Vigurs, and Dasha Doroshenko. Tommy To won the <u>U1300 Section</u>, also with a perfect score; four players tied with 4.0 points but after tiebreaks Krishnav Nair was second and Denis Boko third while Evan Geng and Vincent Mu 'just' received money. Tyler Hun, David Song, Edric Gong, Sparsh Gandhi, Yunhao Tan, Evelyn Lou, Anny Peng, and Siyona Singh were awarded trophies. And there was a four-way tie for first in the seventy-six player <u>U800 Section</u>, resolved in favour of Lucas Lau, Jason Zhu, and Dakshesh Singh respectively, although Kevin Hughes shared in the prize money. Junior trophies went to Sherwin Pang, Adam He, Eli Goodman, Jake Cao, Pranav Nair, Adele Yang, Tiffany Trang Tran, and Sherlyn Pang. <u>Tournament website</u> <u>GVCT #6</u> is coming up on the weekend of December 7 and 8.

FROM JUBILEE TO MEMORIAL

In 1973 the BCCF organized a tournament to celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of the federation. Held in New Westminster on the five days between Christmas and New Year's (two rounds a day), the event attracted a total of sixty-three players including the then Canadian Champion, Peter Biyiasas. Curiously it appears the BCCF got the date of its anniversary wrong; all available contemporary sources indicate the federation was founded in 1916, so one wonders on what basis the earlier date was commemorated. Possibly there was confusion/conflation with the founding of the Vancouver Chess Club. The Diamond Jubilee Open was held annually for the next six years, attracting a maximum of sixty-four players in 1975 but by 1978 the attendance had dropped to just eighteen and the tournament was discontinued. Six years later plans were made to resurrect the tournament at the Kerrisdale Community Centre in August 1984 and early adverts called the event the Diamond Jubilee Open. However, in September of 1974 Jack Taylor, former five-time BC

Champion, had passed away at the age of sixty-seven. To honour his memory a trophy had been donated for the winner of the Diamond Jubilee Open, although when exactly this happened is not clear. By the time the Kerrisdale event took place the tournament name had been changed to the Jack Taylor Memorial, commemorating the dedicatee of the trophy. Tony Berrocoso, Gerry Forbes and Nigel Fullbrook tied for first in a field of thirty-two, but it was not until the tournament was transplanted to Victoria in 1987 under the care of Lynn Stringer that the Jack Taylor Memorial became the annual event we know today.
